SOME CHRISTMAS MUSINGS



Christmas Festivities

Christmas for our forefathers in Sandgate ("the premier seaside watering place for the city of Brisbane") was a busy time. Those of a religious bent flocked to churches. At Christmas 1898, St Nicolas was well attended and "beautifully decorated with palms and flowers" including frangipani and marguerite daisies. Naturally, "anthems and carols were well sung" and, perhaps in deference to the waiting Christmas repast, Canon Matthews "preached short sermons".

Local businesses, especially the bakers, certainly got into the spirit. In 1887, the *Moreton Mail* described the festive array of goodies in the windows of the shops of two of them, Mr Bott and Mr Dow, as "specialities in the eating line" such as cake, plums and currants, "which made the passers-by positively lick their lips as they passed".

Christmas Holidays

Among those passers-by were undoubtedly some of the many holidaymakers who descended on the area in their thousands. The *Telegraph* tells us that on 27 December 1897 "about 3000 persons went down by train in the morning". Spare a thought for the railway workers. The revellers congregated at Moora Park and along Flinders Parade. "Demand for refreshments", said the paper, "appeared to be brisk". No doubt the pubs did a roaring trade.

Christmas Cricket

What else is a Christmas ritual? Well, there's cricket. In Sandgate, the first cricket eleven played under the auspices of the Gordon Club, started by Canon Matthews in 1897 to encourage the sporting endeavours of the youth of the Anglican Church, although the game was played informally well before that. In 1895, the *Queensland Times* reported on an interesting game in Sandgate in which a team of 18 girls played nine boys, "all born cricketers". "According to the paper, "a unique afternoon's amusement" was provided by the spectacle. The writer concluded that "there is already some talk of founding a girls' cricket club". Tell that to the Queensland Heat.





Christmas Mozzies



Especially for those who live close to mangroves, Christmas time has some less happy associations. Think the incessant whine of the mosquito, think the slapping at and squishing them – too late, it's got you – and then, inevitably, there's the scratching. Happily, in the early 1930s, Mr Bill King, a local businessman, launched a counter-offensive against these annoying pests.

He set up a mosquito coil factory in Deagon Street, Nashville, moving later to



Braun St, Deagon. Again, spare a thought for the workers of this enterprise who had to deal with toxic

and unpleasant ingredients, twisting the coils by hand and leaving at the end of the day with their arms covered in the green dye used to colour them.


